**2020 CPD Budget Questions**

**19<sup>th</sup> District**

- How is the department evaluating the effectiveness of SDSCS in increasing public safety in the 19<sup>th</sup> and other districts? What measures are in place to quantify this new tool and when will you make those public?  
*The Department continues to work with independent third party subject matter experts and researchers to evaluate and improve the SDSC technology suite. Both the RAND Corporation and the University of Chicago Crime Lab have put together independent evaluations of the SDSC rooms, with very promising results on the efficacy in crime reduction. CPD continues to work with its partners such as the University of Chicago Crime Lab in ongoing evaluations to enhance the SDSC tools and further reduce and prevent crime. See attachments. - What specific crime reductions strategies are being implemented in the 19<sup>th</sup> District and city-wide to prevent these robberies and catch and fully prosecute those who are preying on our law-abiding citizens?  
*The 19th district will utilize the entertainment bike teams that will patrol the entertainment areas aggressively especially on weekend or during events. The 019 robbery teams will also conduct proactive patrol of the areas that are experiencing an increase in robberies as well as set up missions at the CTA stations to deter robberies. The Community Policing Office will also set up CTA missions to deter robberies. The SDSC room will be utilized as well to gather information and help with conducting proactive patrol in the areas high in robberies.*
- How many of the offenders from FBI-CPD joint carjacking task force have been charged federally? Were any of them charged in connection with carjacking's in the 19<sup>th</sup> District?  
*Four offenders were charged federally by the multi-jurisdictional carjacking task force. There were no offenders charged for carjackings that occurred in 019. CPD continues to work with its federal partners to identify, arrest, and present cases appropriate for federal criminal court, including aggravated vehicular hijacking with a firearm offenses.*
- What percent of 911 calls in the 44<sup>th</sup> Ward involved crimes on a train, platform or stations property? What percent have happened citywide?  
*OEMC is better able to answer the question as to the number of 911 calls in the 44<sup>th</sup> Ward. CPD has provided a breakdown of CTA related crime data in the 19<sup>th</sup> District; please see attachments "CTA Incidents"*
- How many officers are currently assigned to the Public section as of Nov. 1, 2019?  
*The Public Transportation Section has 1 Commander, 3 Lieutenants, 15 Sergeants and 159 Police Officers assigned to the Unit. Approximately 9 officers are assigned to desk duties across 3 watches and 1 officer is assigned to our Transit Security Team.*
- Specific to the CTA train system, how many stations and miles are the officers in Public Transportation expected to cover?  
*There are 145 rail stations throughout the CTA system covering 222 miles.*

- How the officers are currently assigned to the Public Transportation section deployed? How many of them work primarily at desk jobs?  
*On average officers assigned to Public Transportation are deployed in three units:  
 Mass Transit Unit-195 sworn members  
 CTA Security Unit-30 sworn members  
Transit Security Unit-225 sworn members  
 Total sworn members 450  
 Approximately 9 officers are assigned to desk duties across 3 watches and 1 officer is assigned to our Transit Security Team.*
- How often is the effectiveness of the staffing level and deployment evaluated?  
*Staffing levels and deployment are evaluated daily throughout the system.*
- Are members of the Public Transportation section assigned to train stations in the 44<sup>th</sup> Ward on Wrigley Field game and event days?  
*On "non event" days in the 44th Ward, a Red Line North unit is deployed between Fullerton-Argyle with special attention being given at "Belmont" on a daily basis from 1300hrs-2130hrs. A Red Line North unit is deployed daily between Belmont-Howard from 2100hrs-0530hrs. There is also a fixed post unit deployed at Belmont between 2130hrs-0600hrs. The other mentioned units ride the trains between their assigned locations.*
- Can the public Transportation Commander provide me with the number and category of crimes committed at 44<sup>th</sup> Ward CTA stations or on trains within our 44<sup>th</sup> Ward boundaries?

- Broken down by watches, how many times thus far in 2019 has the 19<sup>th</sup> District been on RAP status and what are you doing to rectify the situation?  
*RAPS in 019th District 01 JAN 2019 - 31 DEC 2019 Total: 147, 2200 - 0559 (1st Watch) 17, 0600 - 1359 (2nd Watch) 42, 1400 - 2159 (3rd Watch) 88*
- Where does the 19<sup>th</sup> District rank in terms of homicides, burglaries, robberies and criminal sexual assaults? Please provide data for 2018 and 2019 YTD

- How many property crime detectives are currently assigned and working in the 19<sup>th</sup> District?  
*We currently have 11 Robbery Burglary Detectives assigned to the 019th District.*
- What is the clearance rate for these detectives? How does that rank among their peers assigned to other districts?  
*The 019th District clearance rate for robberies is currently 31.30% for robberies and the average citywide is 37.55%.  
 The 019th District clearance rate for burglaries is currently 24.85% for robberies and the average citywide is 24.71%.*
- How much overtime went to support the needs of the Pride Parade in 2019?  
*There was a total of 4130 accredited overtime hours for the Pride Parade at a cost of \$350,000.*

- I was recently told that CPD "increased the number of clinical personnel available to officers from 3 to 10 for 2019 and will begin hiring the additional staff at the beginning of 2019." How many clinical personnel are available now?  
*Currently we have 9 EAP clinicians and will increase to 11 in 2020.*
- How many times in 2018 and 2019 YTD were officers dispatched to situations that involved a mental health crisis? Threats of suicide?  
*2019 Total CIT Events: 59,150*  
*2018 Total CIT Events: 53,989*

- What percent of patrol officers have received Crisis Intervention Training?  
*As of the end of December 2019, 24% of Chicago Police Officers have received Crisis Intervention Team training.*
- How often is CIT training offered?  
*# of 2019 Basic CIT classes: 28*  
*# of 2018 Basic CIT classes: 28*
- Will you be reopening Areas Four and Five as suggested?  
*We are reopening Area 4 at 3151 W. Harrison and Area 5 at 5555 W. Grand in the spring of 2020.*
- Will the new locations be staffed by homicide, gangs and robbery-burglary detectives or just homicide teams?  
*Area 4 and 5 will be staffed by homicide, gangs and robbery-burglary detectives.*
- Will the new areas have their own commanders, lieutenants, sergeants and detectives or just homicide teams?  
*Area 4 and 5 will be staffed by a Commander, Lieutenants, Sergeants and Detectives.*
- What percent of supervisors in the Bureau of Detectives actually worked as detectives at some point in their career?  
*Unfortunately, we have no database to ascertain what supervisors were detectives prior to becoming a supervisor.*
- How many detectives do you anticipate adding this year and how will they be assigned?  
*The Bureau of Detectives currently has 1,122 Detectives. Our current budgeted positions for detectives are 1,199 (77 below budget). There is no current detective promotional class scheduled at this time. All new newly promoted detectives will be assigned according to vacancies based on the below information.*
- Why are individuals nominated for merit promotions by supervisors not in their chain of command?

*Under the directive of the Interim Superintendent, CPD is no longer conducting merit promotions. However, in the previous process nominators must have knowledge of the nominee's work performance, either through personal observations or based on recommendations from the nominee's supervisors*

- Why are civilian directors nominating police personnel for merit promotions?  
*Under the directive of the Interim Superintendent, CPD is no longer conducting merit promotions. However, in the previous process civilian directors have multiple sworn members reporting to them. Allowing civilian directors to nominate provided the same opportunity for members who did not have a sworn exempt member in their chain of command.*
- How many current exempt members have been meritoriously promoted three times? Two times? Will you consider limiting merit promotions to one for the duration of an officer's career?  
*Under the directive of the Interim Superintendent, CPD is no longer conducting merit promotions. 10 exempt members were meritoriously promoted 2 times.*
- Is there a way for overtime to be reduced by working with CCSAO in only requiring CPD personnel when they will testify or otherwise be needed in the courtroom?  
*Special Order S08-02 has been updated to help reduce overtime for court appearances.*
- How does the use of overtime break down among the various bureaus?  
*In 2019, CPD's overtime breakdown by Bureau was as follows:  
Bureau of Patrol: 65.3%  
Bureau of Detectives: 18.8%  
Bureau of Organized Crime: 9.5%  
Bureau of Organizational Development: 2.6%  
Bureau of Technical Services: 0.97%  
Bureau of Internal Affairs: 0.54%  
Other outside units: 2.3%*
- Does CPD track and anticipate what compensatory time payouts will be on an annual basis? If so, how much do you estimate you'll be paying out in 2020?  
*CPD does track compensatory time payouts. At this time, CPD is not capable of estimating payouts annually due to limitations in the collective bargaining agreements.*
- As I understand it, accrued time is cashed out at last career service rank. Is this true?  
*Yes.*
- Why are officers not paid annually for unused comp time? Can CPD institute this accounting procedure as a way of reducing this budget item?  
*Compensatory time usage is covered under the collective bargaining agreements.*
- How many deputy chiefs are there today? What is the total pay for deputy chiefs?  
*18. \$170,112.00.*
- Why does the number of deputy chiefs continue to increase?  
*The Chicago Police Department has continued to establish priority units and bureaus that require exempt command supervisory authority and leadership in order to fulfill their duties. The deputy chiefs also stand in when a chief is on furlough, medical, or requires additional management support to carry out certain priority functions within a unit or bureau.*

- Will there be changes to CPD's utilization of its SWAT unit?  
*Details about changes to SWAT are contained in Special Order S05-05.*
- How is SWAT currently used on a daily basis? How many officers are assigned to SWAT?  
*Details about changes to SWAT are contained in Special Order S05-05. 74 officers are assigned to SWAT.*
- Including all ranks, how many officers have retired in 2018 and 2019 YTD?  
*2018-454*  
*2019-431 (as of 12/9/2019)*
- How many probationary police officers graduated from the academy in 2018 and 2019 year to date?  
*1240 officers graduated in 2018 and are now assigned in the field either on probationary or sworn status. Of the 2019 classes, 185 are currently in the field on probationary status and 268 are in the Academy.*
- How many uniform checks were distributed on February 1, August 1, and December 1, 2019?  
*All active sworn members of CPD below the exempt ranks are entitled to a uniform allowance. CPD does not have the exact number, but the City Comptroller's Office can provide an exact number of distributions for 2019.*
- How many current Chicago Police Officers, of those who have not filed the paperwork to retire, meet the age 50 and 20 years of service requirements to retire today?  
*See attachment. "Office of Budget & Management Memorandum" – 1,070 total, 891 of which are police officers.*
- Does CPD have a designated LGBTQ Liaison? If so, who is this officer and where is the officer housed?  
*Megan Woods assigned to the 019<sup>th</sup> District is the LGBTQ Liaison Officer.*
- How many individuals are housed in the Civil Rights Unit?  
*Three individuals are housed in the Civil Rights Unit.*
- How does the recently reported increase in CTA crime impact the Chicago Police Detail Fund?  
*CPD is currently in renegotiations with CTA on a new memorandum of understanding.*
- What is the plan to keep the appropriate number of officers in the 19<sup>th</sup> District?  
*CPD will do all that we can to ensure staffing levels meet the needs of the community. As required under the consent decree, CPD is currently working to formalize a Department-wide staffing assessment to inform deployments and district assignments based upon a myriad of factors, including crime trend analysis.*
- What is the department's plan for the 19<sup>th</sup> District station at Belmont and Western?  
*The station at Belmont and Western will continue to be used in its current capacity.*
- There was a 135% increase for the payment of tort and non-tort judgements, outside counsel expenses and expert costs, as approved by the corporation counsel. What is the purpose of increasing the spending by this much?  
*The Chicago Law Department is best equipped to answer this question.*
- The number of positions in human resources decreased by 39, from 79 to 40. Can you explain why?

*Civilian members assigned to the Human Resources Department had their unit designations changed from 057 to 051.*

# Real-Time Crime Centers in Chicago: Evaluation of the Chicago Police Department's Strategic Decision Support Centers

Strategic Decision Support Centers (SDSCs) are the Chicago Police Department's district-level real-time crime centers, launched in January 2017 and expanded in 2018. They serve as command and control centers for staff to gain awareness of what is happening in their districts and decide on responses. SDSCs support daily and weekly planning meetings and provide near-real-time support for detecting, responding, and investigating crimes as they occur. Their objectives are to improve districts' abilities to reduce crime, hold offenders accountable, improve officer safety, and reduce service times.

In this report, the authors evaluate the processes, organizational structures, and technologies employed in the SDSCs. They also assess the extent to which the introduction of SDSCs was associated with reductions in crime levels in the districts. They find that SDSCs are a promising tool for supporting crime reduction. According to the authors' models, a district that adds an SDSC can expect to see reductions in at least some of the ten types of major crimes modeled, including shootings, robbery, burglary, and criminal sexual assault.

More broadly, the authors see SDSCs as a promising model for improving law enforcement agencies' awareness of their communities, improving their decisionmaking, and carrying out more effective and more efficient operations that lead to crime reductions and other policing benefits.

This research was sponsored by Chicago Police Department and the Bureau of Justice Assistance and conducted by the Justice Policy Program within RAND Social and Economic Well-Being.

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# Strategic Decision Support Centers | UChicago Urban Labs

Chicago experienced 769 homicides in 2016, nearly a 60% increase from 2015. This violence destroys individual lives, devastates entire communities, and threatens the future and vitality of the City itself. To combat this violence, starting in February 2017 the Chicago Police Department (CPD) built Strategic Decision Support Centers (SDSCs) in the 007th and 011th districts that bring together police officers and analysts from the Crime Lab to integrate crime intelligence, data analysis, and technology. Based on the early successes in 007 and 011, the Department expanded this strategy, opening SDSCs in eleven more districts by January 2018. Throughout the expansion of the SDSCs, the Crime Lab has embedded analysts, trained CPD analysts, and provided technical assistance around implementation.

This initiative represents a new approach to gun violence prevention that is designed to help police commanders target their resources to the right place at the right time, and be more responsive to communities' needs. SDSCs are rooms in which a suite of technology, district leadership, and analysts trained by the University of Chicago Crime Lab work together to develop localized crime reduction strategies using data analysis, human intelligence and input from the community. These efforts are tailored to meet the unique needs of each community, with community concerns incorporated into the district's daily planning process.

In 2017, Chicago experienced 764 fewer shooting incidents (-22%) relative to 2016. In District 007, historically one of the most violent districts in the city, these impressive gains are promising not just compared to 2016—the district experienced the second lowest level of shootings since CPD began storing this data electronically. These successes are critical to restoring public confidence in law enforcement.

Reducing gun violence in our most violent districts is critical to keeping residents safe and to helping our city thrive. Through the development of localized crime reduction strategies, tailored to meet the needs of the community, the SDSCs hold promise for leveraging the data, technology, and human intelligence available to CPD to make real progress on public safety and to promote police-community trust.

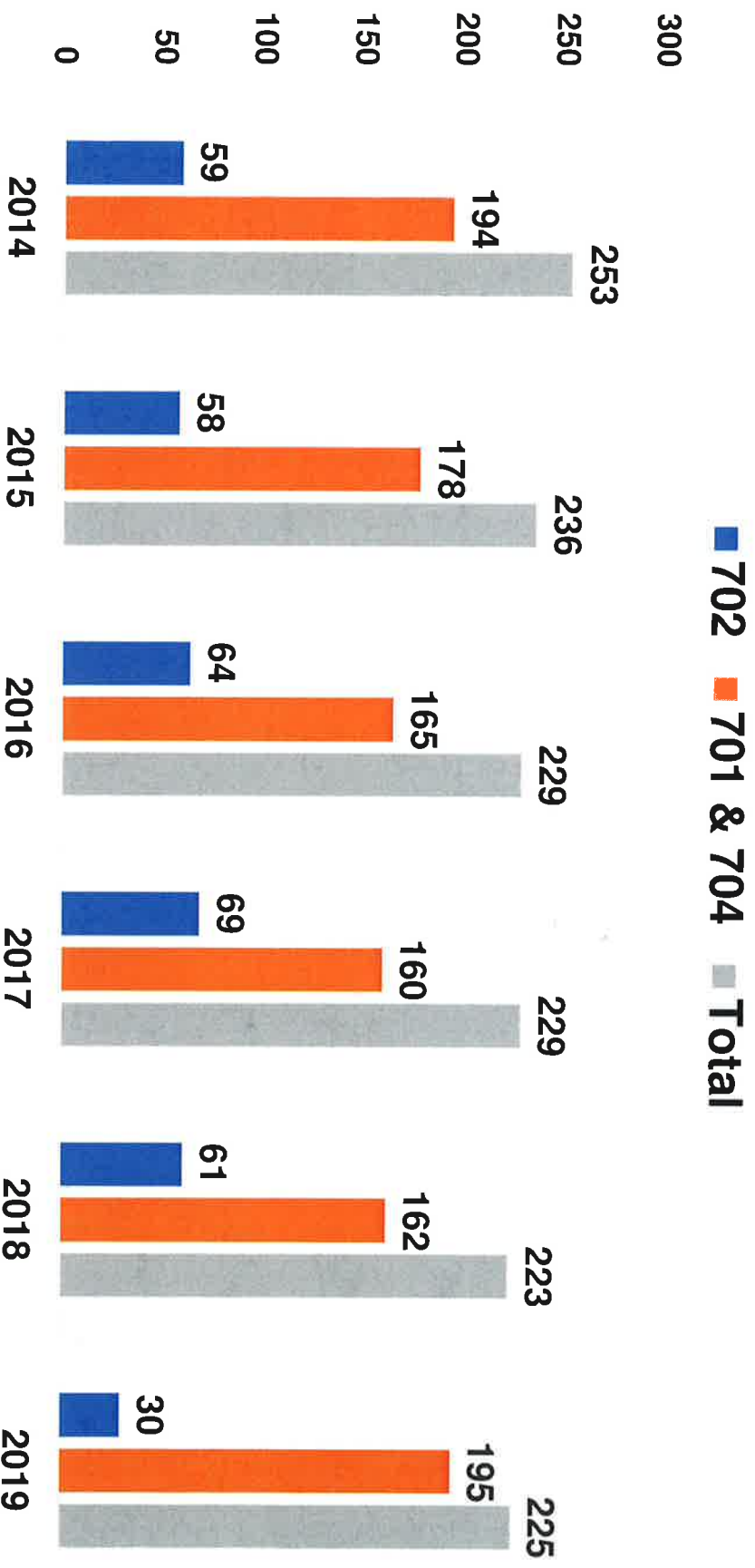

2014 through 2019

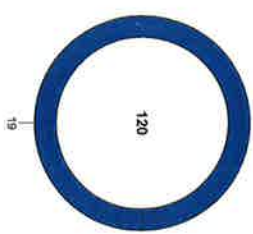

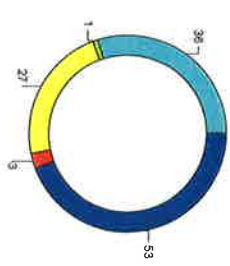

# CTA INCIDENTS 01-Jan-2019 to 08-Dec-2019

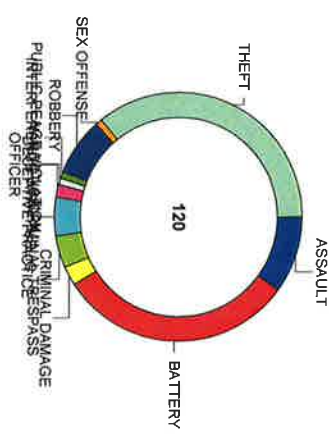

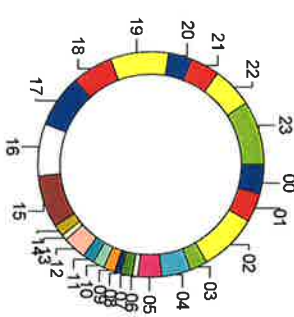

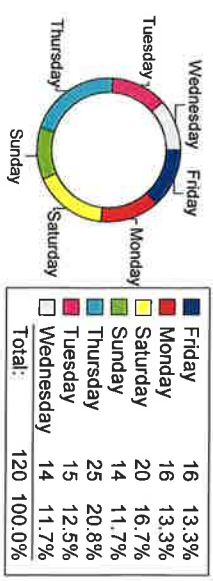

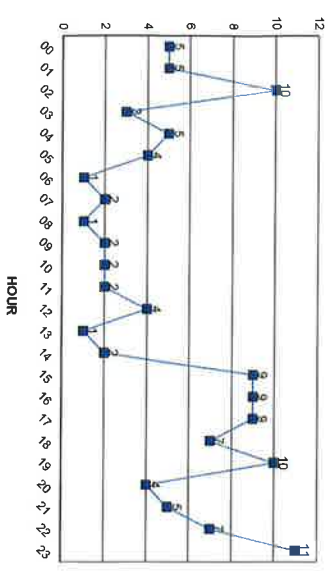
